1. NATURE AND CONTINUANCE OF OPERATIONS

Canamera Energy Metals Corp. (the “Company”) was incorporated on September 27, 2018, under the laws of the Province of British Columbia, Canada.

The Company is a resource exploration company that is acquiring and exploring mineral properties. The head office, principal address, records office and registered address of the Company are located at Suite 710 - 1030 West Georgia Street, Vancouver, BC V6E 2Y3.

These financial statements have been prepared on the assumption that the Company will continue as a going concern, meaning it will continue in operation for the foreseeable future and will be able to realize assets and discharge liabilities in the ordinary course of operations. At October 31, 2024, the Company had not yet achieved profitable operations, had accumulated losses of \$647,632 (April 30, 2024 - \$630,069) since its inception and expects to incur further losses in the development of its property, all of which casts significant doubt about the Company’s ability to continue as a going concern. Different bases of measurement may be appropriate if the Company is not expected to continue operations for the foreseeable future. The Company’s continuation as a going concern is dependent upon the successful results from its business activities and its ability to attain profitable operations and generate funds therefrom and/or raise equity capital or borrowings sufficient to meet current and future obligations. Management intends to finance operating costs over the next twelve months with loans from directors and companies controlled by directors.

2. BASIS OF PREPARATION

Statement of Compliance and basis of presentation

These condensed interim financial statements, including comparatives, have been prepared in accordance with International Accounting Standards (“IAS”) 34 ‘Interim Financial Reporting’ (“IAS 34”) using accounting policies consistent with IFRS issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (“IASB”) and Interpretations of the International Financial Reporting Interpretations Committee (“IFRIC”).

These condensed interim financial statements have been prepared on the basis of accounting policies, methods of computation, and estimates and judgements consistent with those applied in the Company’s April 30, 2024 annual financial statements.

These condensed interim financial statements do not include all of the information required of full audited financial statements and therefore these condensed interim financial statements should be read in conjunction with the annual financial statements for the year ended April 30, 2024.

Functional and presentation currency

The financial statements are presented in Canadian Dollars, which is the Company’s functional and presentation currency.

Approval of the financial statements

The condensed interim financial statements of the Company for the period ended January 31, 2025, were approved and authorized for issuance by the Board of Directors on March 24, 2025.

5. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Key management personnel include people who have the authority and responsibility for planning, directing, and controlling the activities of the Company as a whole. The Company has determined the key personnel to be the executive and non-executive officers and directors of the Company.

During the period ended January 31, 2025, the Company expensed \$2,100 (2024 – \$2,000) of professional fees, of which \$2,100 (April 30, 2024 - \$5,250) is included in accounts payable at January 31, 2025, to a company, Element Accounting Professional Corporation, controlled by the Chief Financial Officer.

6. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS AND RISK MANAGEMENT

Cash is carried at fair value using a level 1 fair value measurement. The carrying value of cash, accounts payable and accrued liabilities, and due to related party approximate their fair value because of the short-term nature of these instruments.

Fair value estimates of financial instruments are made at a specific point in time, based on relevant information about financial markets and specific financial instruments. As these estimates are subjective in nature, involving uncertainties and matters of significant judgment, they cannot be determined with precision. Changes in assumptions can significantly affect estimated fair values.

There have been no changes from the prior year.

The Company's risk exposures and the impact on the Company's financial instruments are summarized below:

Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk of potential loss to the Company if the counterparty to a financial instrument fails to meet its contractual obligations. The Company's credit risk is primarily attributable to its liquid financial assets including cash. The Company limits exposure to credit risk on liquid financial assets through maintaining its cash with high-credit quality financial institutions.

Liquidity risk

The Company's approach to managing liquidity risk is to ensure that it will have sufficient liquidity to meet liabilities when due. As at January 31, 2025, the Company had a cash balance of \$162,607 (April 30, 2024 - \$203,515) to settle current liabilities of \$50,432 (April 30, 2024 - \$57,315). All of the Company's accounts payable and accrued liabilities have contractual maturities of 30 days or due on demand and are subject to normal trade terms. To maintain liquidity, the Company is currently investigating financing opportunities.

Market risk

Market risk is the risk of loss that may arise from changes in market factors such as interest rates, foreign exchange rates, and commodity and equity prices. The Company does not have a practice of trading derivatives.

6. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS AND RISK MANAGEMENT

Interest rate risk

The Company's financial assets exposed to interest rate risk consist of cash balances. The Company's current policy is to invest excess cash in investment-grade short-term deposit certificates issued by its banking institutions. The Company periodically monitors the investments it makes and is satisfied with the credit ratings of its banks. As at January 31, 2025 and April 30, 2024, the Company did not have any investments in investment-grade short-term deposit certificates.

Foreign currency risk

Foreign currency risk is the risk of loss that may arise from changes foreign exchange rates. The Company does not have a practice of trading derivatives.

Price risk

Other price risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate due to changes in market prices, other than those arising from interest rate risk or foreign currency risk. The Company is not exposed to significant other price risk.
