The management of Aileron Ventures Limited (the "**Company**" or "**Aileron**") is pleased to present the Company's management's discussion and analysis (the "**MD&A**") for the year ended December 31, 2014.

This MD&A has been prepared by Aileron as of April 27, 2015 and should be read in conjunction with the audited financial statements of Aileron for the year ended December 31, 2014 (the "**Financial Statements**"). Results are reported in Canadian dollars, unless otherwise stated and have been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards ("**IFRS**").

The accompanying Financial Statements for the year ended December 31, 2014, have been prepared assuming that the Company will continue as a going concern. As discussed in note 2 to the Financial Statements, the Company's recurring losses from operations, shareholders' deficiency, and inability to generate sufficient cash flow to meet its obligations and sustain its operations raise substantial doubt about its ability to continue as a going concern. The Financial Statements do not include any adjustments that might result from the outcome of this uncertainty.

Readers of this MD&A should refer to "Significant Accounting Policies" below for a discussion of IFRS and its effect on Aileron's financial presentation.

Overall Performance

Aileron was incorporated in Alberta on May 31, 2010. The Company has not carried on any active business to-date other than (i) to make an investment in Altius Edge Ltd. ("Altius") to acquire 50% of the outstanding common shares thereof, (ii) to undertake matters in connection with an amalgamation transaction involving Altius and Immunall Science Inc. ("Immunall"), and (iii) to engage in activities to identify and evaluate businesses and assets with a view to completing an acquisition of a business or assets. Aileron has not yet selected a business sector or industry in which to focus its pursuit of a business transaction.

Risks and Uncertainties

As of December 31, 2014, the Company had no business or material assets other than cash and its investment in Immunall. The Company does not have a history of earnings, nor has it paid any dividends since it was incorporated. Aileron's assets are limited to its cash balances and an approximate 5.5% investment in Immunall. There is no assurance that the Company will be able to obtain additional funding.

Results of Operations

For the year ended December 31, 2014, Aileron has had no active operations. During the period, management of the company continued to engage in activities to identify and evaluate businesses and assets with a view to completing an acquisition of a business or assets that may be suitable for the Company. For the year ended December 31, 2014, the Company had a net loss of \$14,238. The net loss is related to bank charges, general and administrative expenses and professional fees. A breakdown of the material components of general and administrative expenses for the years ended December 31, 2014 and December 31, 2013 is as follows:

For the three months ended December 31, 2014, Aileron had no active operations. For the three months ended December 31, 2014, the Company had a net loss of \$(6,621). The net loss is related to bank charges, general and administrative expenses and professional fees.

Outstanding Share Data

As at April 27, 2015 the Company had 9,664,155 common shares issued and outstanding.

Liquidity and Capital Resources

As at December 31, 2014 Aileron had working capital deficit of \$54,237. The Company does not have adequate capital resources to fund its near-term objective of identifying and completing a business transaction, and as a result will need to seek adequate debt or equity financing in order to establish the business of the Company. Aileron presently relies upon advances from affiliates in order to fund general and administrative expenses and pay other costs necessary for Aileron to continue to maintain its status as a reporting issuer. The Company expects to continue to receive the financial support of its affiliates in order to pay its liabilities as they become due.

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Financial Instruments

The Company's financial instruments consist of cash, investment, accounts payable and accrued liabilities and due to affiliates. It is management's opinion that the Company is not exposed to significant currency or credit risks arising from these financial instruments and that the fair value of these financial instruments approximates their carrying values. For further discussion of financial instrument risks, see Financial Instruments and Risk Management, below.

Significant accounting policies

The accounting policies of Aileron used in the determination of the results for the year ended December 31, 2014 that are disclosed and analyzed in this report are described in detail in note 4 of the Financial Statements. These policies have been applied in preparing the Financial Statements for the year ended December 31, 2014 and the comparative information presented in the Financial Statements for the year ended December 31, 2013.

A summary of Aileron's significant accounting policies under IFRS is presented in note 4 to the Financial Statements for the year ended December 31, 2014. These policies have been retrospectively and consistently applied.

Future accounting standards

The standard-setting bodies that determine IFRS have significant ongoing projects that could impact the IFRS accounting policies that we have selected. The impact of any new or amended IFRS standards or interpretations will be evaluated as they are drafted and published.

The Company has adopted the following new and amended standards, along with any consequential amendments, effective January 1, 2014:

- IAS 32 "Financial Instruments: Presentation", was amended to clarify the criteria that should be considered in determining whether an entity has a legally enforceable right to offset in respect of its financial instruments and clarifying the treatment of income taxes related to distributions and transaction costs.
- IAS 36 "Impairment of Assets". This standard was amended to modify certain disclosure requirements about the recoverable amount of impaired assets if that amount is based on fair value less costs of disposal.
- IAS 39 "Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement". This standard was amended to allow hedge accounting to continue in a situation where a derivative, which has been designated as a hedging instrument, is novated to effect clearing with a central counterparty as a result of laws or regulation, if specific conditions are met (in this context, a novation indicates that parties to a contract agree to replace their original counterparty with a new one). Similar relief will be included in IFRS 9 "Financial Instruments".

In addition to the adoption of the new standards as detailed above, there have also been amendments to existing standards. The adoption of the above standards and amendments has had no impact on the Company's financial statements.

Pronouncements effective for annual periods beginning on or after January 1, 2017:

- IFRS 9 "Financial Instruments". IFRS 9 provides a comprehensive standard on accounting for financial instruments. The package of improvements introduced by IFRS 9 includes a logical model for classification and measurement, a single, forward-looking "expected loss" impairment model and a substantially-reformed approach to hedge accounting.
- IFRS 15 "Revenue from Contracts with Customers". This new standard was jointly developed by the IASB and FASB. The core principle of the new Standard is for companies to recognize revenue to depict the transfer of goods or services to customers in amounts that reflect the consideration to which the company

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expects to be entitled in exchange for those goods or services. This new Standard will also result in enhanced disclosures about revenue; provide guidance for transactions that were not previously addressed comprehensively (for example, Service revenue and contract modifications) and improve guidance for multiple-element arrangements.

The Company has not yet completed its assessment and evaluation of the effect of adopting the new and amended standards and the impact they may have on its financial statements.

Related Party Transactions

The amount of \$50,268 is due to affiliates and is payable to Mosaic Limited Partnership and Mosaic Capital Corporation, entities related through common ownership, arising from these entities providing advances to the Company in order to enable it to satisfy its financial obligations as they become due. These amounts are unsecured, non-interest bearing and have no fixed terms of repayment.

Related party transactions are in the normal course of operations and are recorded at the fair value.

Off-Balance Sheet Items

As at December 31, 2014, the Company has no off-balance sheet items.

Financial Instruments and Risk Management

The Company has the following financial instruments:

Cash and investment are designated as held-for-trading and are measured at fair value. Accounts payable and accrued liabilities and due to affiliate are classified as other financial liabilities and are measured at amortized cost.

The Company is exposed to financial risk arising from its financial assets. The Company manages its exposure to financial risks in a manner that minimizes its exposure to the extent practical. The main financial risks affecting the Company are as follows:

(a) Credit risk

The financial instruments that potentially subject the Company to a significant concentration of credit risk consist primarily of cash. The Company mitigates its exposure to credit loss by placing its cash with major financial institutions.

(b) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Company will not be able to meet its financial obligations as they are due. The Company's approach to managing liquidity is to ensure, as far as possible, that it will have sufficient liquidity to meet its liabilities when due without incurring unacceptable losses or risking harm to the Company's reputation. The Company expects to continue to receive the financial support of its affiliate in order to pay its liabilities as they become due.

(c) Fair values

The fair value of cash, accounts payable and accrued liabilities and due to affiliate approximate their carrying value because of the short-term nature. Currently the Company is not involved in any hedging activities.

Financial instruments recorded at fair value on the statements of financial position are classified using a fair value hierarchy that reflects the significance of the inputs used in making the measurements. The fair value hierarchy has the following levels:

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Level 1 - reflects valuation based on quoted prices observed in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

Level 2 - reflects valuation techniques based on inputs that are quoted prices of similarly instruments in active markets; quoted prices for identical or similar instruments in markets that are not active; inputs other than quoted prices used in a valuation model that are observable for the instrument; and inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

Level 3 - reflects valuation techniques with significant unobservable market inputs.

A financial instrument is classified to the lowest level of the hierarchy for which a significant input has been considered in measuring fair value. The financial instruments in the Company's financial statements, measured at Level 1 fair value, are cash and investment.

Fourth Quarter 2014 Overview

No significant activity or transactions occurred during the year ended December 31, 2014.

Outlook

The Company will continue to engage in activities to identify and evaluate businesses and assets with a view to completing a transaction which will establish the business of the Company.
