MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS
PERIOD ENDED SEPTEMBER 30, 2014

This management discussion and analysis of financial position and results of operations ("MD&A") is prepared as November 28, 2014 and should be read in conjunction with the unaudited condensed interim financial statements for the period ended September 30, 2014 of Far Resources Ltd. ("Far" or the "Company") with the related notes thereto. Those unaudited condensed interim financial statements have been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS").

Readers may also want to refer to the March 31, 2014 audited financial statements and the accompanying notes. All dollar amounts included therein and in the following MD&A are expressed in Canadian dollars except where noted.

Further information regarding the Company and its operations are filed electronically on the System for Electronic Document Analysis and Retrieval (SEDAR) in Canada and can be obtained from www.sedar.com.

1.1 Date

This MD&A is dated as of November 28, 2014.

1.2 Overall Performance

Winston Property

Subsequent to the quarter ended September 30, 2014, the Company entered into an option agreement with Redline Minerals Inc. ("Redline"), Redline Mining Corporation ("RMC"), and Southwest Land & Exploration Inc. ("SWLE") (collectively, the "Optionors") to acquire up to an 80% interest in and to 105 unpatented and 2 patented mineral claims located in Sierra Country, New Mexico, U.S.A.

The Option Agreement supersedes and replaces the binding letter of intent ("LOI") between the Company and Redline announced on November 5, 2013 and sets out the terms under which Far can acquire an initial 50% interest in the Property (the "Initial Option") and further sets out how the Company can earn up to an additional 30% interest in the Property (the "Additional Option") from the Optioners.

The Company has the option to acquire an initial 50% interest upon completion of the following:

- a) Cash payments to Redline of \$66,250 (paid);
- b) Cash payment of \$13,750 on November 15, 2014 (paid)
- c) Cash payment of \$15,000 or share issuance of 300,000 common shares of the Company on January 15, 2015;
- d) Payment of \$240,000 over 3 years for \$80,000 per year;
- e) Issuance of 2,500,000 common shares of the Company over 4 years for 500,000 shares per year , with the first tranche due on closing and the remaining shares due on the anniversary dates of the Option Agreement; and
- f) Incurring exploration expenditures totaling \$1,000,000 over a period of 4 years, of which \$200,000 is to be spent in the first and second years, respectively, and \$300,000 in each subsequent year.

Upon acquiring the initial 50% interest, the Company will have a further option to acquire up to an additional 30% interest, in increments of 10% per annum, by completing the following:

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- a) Payment of \$240,000 over 3 years for \$80,000 per year;
- b) Issuance of 1,500,000 common shares of the Company over 3 years for 500,000 shares per year; and
- c) Incurring exploration expenditures totaling \$1,500,000 over a period of 3 years for \$500,000 per year.

Upon exercise of the Initial Option, the Company and the Optionors will enter into a joint venture agreement for further exploration and development of the Property with the Company as the initial operator.

For the three month period ended September 30, 2014

The Company earned no revenue and had a comprehensive loss of \$45,293 (2013 - \$69,775).

Total expenses were \$45,293 (2013 – \$69,775), comprised of the following significant items:

- Professional fees of \$12,250 (2013 - \$22,263) decreased as a result of the decrease in accounting and legal services.
- Management fees of \$21,000 (2013 - \$19,500) were related to director fees and administrative fees paid or accrued to the directors and CEO of the Company (refer to section 1.8).

As at September 30, 2014, the Company had total assets of \$240,269 consisting of cash of \$21,929, GST receivable of \$4,702 and exploration and evaluation assets of \$213,638.

The total liabilities of the Company as of September 30, 2014 were \$330,053, which consisted of accounts payable and accrued liabilities and short-term loan payable.

For the six months period ended September 30, 2014:

The Company earned no revenue and had a comprehensive loss of \$95,852 (2013 - \$173,217).

Total expenses were \$95,852 (2013 - \$173,217), comprised of the following significant items:

- Professional fees of \$28,200 (2013 - \$43,266) were higher in the current period as a result of increased transactions and activities related to accounting and legal services.
- Management fees of \$42,000 (2013 - \$39,000) were related to director fees and administrative fees paid or accrued to the CEO and directors of the Company.
- Consulting fees of \$(1,000) (2013 - \$21,000) decreased as a result of decreased consulting work during the current period.
- Rent of \$6,000 (2013 - \$10,500) decreased as a result of new rental agreement the Company entered into in the current period.
- Share-based compensation of \$8,134 (2013 - \$22,754) as a result of 200,000 options granted to a consultant during the current period.

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1.5 Liquidity

The Company has not generated any revenue from operations and to date has relied entirely upon the sale, by way of private placement, of Common Shares and Seed Units to carry on its business. See Item 1.6 "Capital Resources" below.

The Company's financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis and assume that the Company will be able to realize its assets and discharge its liabilities in the normal course of business for the foreseeable future. The continuing operations of the Company are dependent upon its ability to continue to raise adequate financing.

Net cash used in operating activities for the period ending September 30, 2014 was \$54,687 compared to \$88,561 used during the period ending September 30, 2013 and consists primarily of the operating loss adjusted for other income and changes in non-cash working capital items.

Net cash used in investing activities for the period ending September 30, 2014 was \$57,500 compared to of \$28,339 during the period ending September 30, 2013, which mainly consists of exploration and evaluation acquisition costs.

Net cash provided by financing activities for the period ending September 30, 2014 was \$115,000 compared to \$Nil provided during the period ending September 30, 2013. The increase was due to loans advanced to the Company during the period ended September 30, 2014.

As of September 30, 2014, the Company had a working capital deficit of \$303,422 comprised of current assets of \$26,631 and current liabilities of \$330,053.

The Company will need to obtain additional debt/equity financing in order to carry out its proposed exploration programs on its properties and satisfy its business and properties commitments for the ensuing year.

1.6 Capital Resources

During the period ended September 30, 2014, the Company received \$152,000 of non-interest bearing demand loan with no fixed term, of which \$57,000 was from a director of the Company.

Contractual Obligations

Other than miscellaneous stock option and consulting agreements, the Company does not presently have any other material contractual obligations. See Item 1.8 "Transactions with Related Parties".

As at September 30, 2014, the Company had no long-term debt.

During the six months ended September 30, 2014, the Company received \$95,000 in loan payable on demand, with no interest and no fixed term. It is the intention of the Company and its lenders to convert this loan into shares of the Company at \$0.05/share. As at the date of this MD&A, the transaction to finalize this share conversion has not completed.

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1.7 Off-Balance Sheet Arrangements

The Company does not utilize off-balance sheet arrangements.

1.8 Transactions with Related Parties

During the period ended September 30, 2014 the Company paid or accrued a total of \$30,000 in management fees to Keith C. Anderson in his capacity as the President and Chief Executive Officer of the Company.

During the same period, the Company paid or accrued a total of \$6,000 in management fees to Leon F. Anderson, a director and former Secretary of the Company, \$6,000 in management fees to Lindsay Bottomer, a director of the Company and \$22,000 in accounting fees to Davidson & Company LLP. Cyrus Driver, the Chief Financial Officer and a director of the Company, is a partner of Davidson & Company LLP.

1.9 Proposed Transactions

1.10 New Accounting Standards and Amendments to Existing Standards

New and amended standards adopted by the Company

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The following new and amended standards have become effective for the Company's March 31, 2015 reporting period. Adoption of these standards did not result in a significant impact on the Company's financial statements.

- Amendments to IAS 32, *Financial Instruments: Presentation*, provide clarification on the application of offsetting rules.
- Amendments to IAS 36, *Impairment of Assets*, clarify the recoverable amount disclosures for non-financial assets, including additional disclosures about the measurement of the recoverable amount of impaired assets when the recoverable amount was based on fair value less costs of disposal.
- Amendments to IFRS 10, *Consolidated Financial Statements*, IFRS 12, *Disclosures of Interests in Other Entities* and IAS 27, *Separate Financial Statements*. The amendments provide for the definition of an investment entity and sets out an exception to consolidating particular subsidiaries of an investment entity. The amendments also deal with the disclosures required and preparation of separate financial statements of an investment entity.

New or revised standards and amendments to existing standards not yet effective

The Company has not applied the following new or revised standards and amendments that have been issued but are not yet effective for the Company's September 30, 2014 reporting period:

- New standard IFRS 9, *Financial Instruments*, classification and measurement is the first part of a new standard on classification and measurement of financial assets that will replace IAS 39, "Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement." IFRS 9 has two measurement categories: amortized cost and fair value. All equity instruments are measured at fair value. A debt instrument is at amortized cost only if the entity is holding it to collect contractual cash flows and the cash flows represent principal and interest. Otherwise it is at fair value through profit and loss. This standard is effective for years beginning on or after January 1, 2018.

The Company plans to adopt these standards as soon as they become effective for the Company's reporting period.

1.11 Financial and Other Instruments

Capital and Financial Risk Management

Capital management

The Company's objective when managing capital is to safeguard the entity's ability to continue as a going concern.

In the management of capital, the Company monitors its adjusted capital which comprises all components of equity (i.e. capital stock, reserves and deficit).

The Company sets the amount of capital in proportion to risk. The Company manages the capital structure and makes adjustments to it in the light of changes in economic conditions and the risk characteristics of the underlying assets. In order to maintain or adjust the capital structure, the Company may issue Common Shares through private placements. The Company is not exposed to any externally imposed capital requirements.

The Company's overall strategy remains unchanged from fiscal year 2014.

Fair value

Fair value estimates of financial instruments are made at a specific point in time, based on relevant information about financial markets and specific financial instruments. As these estimates are subjective in nature, involving uncertainties

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and matters of significant judgment, they cannot be determined with precision. Changes in assumptions can significantly affect estimated fair values.

The carrying value of cash, receivables, short-term loan payable and accounts payable and accrued liabilities approximate their fair value because of the short-term nature of these instruments.

Financial risk factors

The Company's risk exposures and the impact on the Company's financial instruments are summarized below:

Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk of loss associated with counterparty's inability to fulfill its payment obligations. Financial instruments that potentially subject the Company to a significant concentration of credit risk consist primarily of cash. The Company limits its exposure to credit loss by placing its cash with major Canadian financial institutions.

Liquidity risk

The Company's approach to managing liquidity risk is to ensure that it will have sufficient liquidity to meet liabilities when due. As at September 30, 2014, the Company had a cash balance of \$21,929 (March 31, 2014 – \$19,116) to settle current liabilities of \$330,053 (March 31, 2014 – \$182,181). All of the Company's financial liabilities have contractual maturities of 30 days or due on demand and are subject to normal trade terms.

Market risk

Market risk is the risk of loss that may arise from changes in market factors such as interest rates, foreign exchange rates, and commodity and equity prices.

(a) Interest rate risk

The Company has cash and cash equivalents balances and no interest-bearing debt. The Company's cash and cash equivalents do not have significant exposure to interest. As of September 30, 2014 and March 31, 2014, the Company did not have any investments.

(b) Foreign currency risk

The Company is exposed to foreign currency risk on fluctuations related to cash, receivables and accounts payable and accrued liabilities that are denominated in a foreign currency. As at September 30, 2014 and March 31, 2014, the Company did not have any accounts in foreign currencies and considers foreign currency risk insignificant.

(c) Price risk

The Company is exposed to price risk with respect to commodity and equity prices. Equity price risk is defined as the potential adverse impact on the Company's earnings due to movements in individual equity prices or general movements in the level of the stock market. Commodity price risk is defined as the potential adverse impact on earnings and economic value due to commodity price movements and volatilities. The Company closely monitors commodity prices of gold, individual equity movements, and the stock market to determine the appropriate course of action to be taken by the Company.

Save and except as aforesaid, there were no significant changes in the Company's accounting policies during the period ended September 30, 2014.

Upon exercise of the Initial Option, the Company and the Optionors will enter into a joint venture agreement for further exploration and development of the Property with the Company as the initial operator.

Additional Disclosure for Junior Issuers

The Company requires additional funds to cover the estimated general and administrative expenses. There can be no assurance that financing, whether debt or equity, will always be available to the Company in the amount required at any particular time or for any particular period or, if available, that it can be obtained on terms satisfactory to the Company. See "Risks and Uncertainties" below.

Risks and Uncertainties

Mineral exploration is subject to a high degree of risk, which even a combination of experience, knowledge and careful evaluation may fail to overcome. These risks may be even greater in the Company's case given its formative stage of development.

Exploration activities are expensive and seldom result in the discovery of a commercially viable resource. There is no assurance that the Company's exploration will result in the discovery of an economically viable mineral deposit. The Company has generated losses to date and anticipates that it will have sufficient financial resources to undertake its planned exploration programs for the ensuing year, it will require additional funds to further explore its properties. There is no assurance such additional funding will be available to the Company on commercially reasonable terms or at all. Additional equity financing may result in substantial dilution thereby reducing the marketability of the Company's shares. The Company's activities are subject to the risks normally encountered in the mining exploration business. The economics of exploring, developing and operating resource properties are affected by many factors including the cost of exploration and development operations, variations of the grade of any ore mined and the rate of resource extraction and fluctuations in the price of resources produced, government regulations relating to royalties, taxes and environmental protection and title defects. The Company's mineral resource properties have not been surveyed and may be subject to prior unregistered agreements, interests or land claims and title may be affected by undetected defects. In addition, the Company may become subject to liability for hazards against which it is not insured. The mining industry is highly competitive in all its phases and the Company competes with other mining companies, many with greater financial and technical resources, in the search for, and the acquisition of, mineral resource properties and in the marketing of minerals. Additional risks include the current lack of any market for the Company's securities and the present intention of the Company not to pay dividends. Certain of the Company's directors and officers also serve as directors or officers of other public and private resource companies, and to the extent that such other companies may participate in ventures in which the Company may participate, such directors and officers of the Company may have a conflict of interest. Finally, the Company has no history of earnings, and there is no assurance that any of its current or future mineral properties will generate earnings, operate profitably or provide a return on investment in the future. There is no assurance that the Company will be successful in achieving a return on shareholders' investment and the likelihood of success must be considered in light of its early stage of operations.
