DESCRIPTION OF BUSINESS

Q Battery Metals Corp. (formerly Black Tusk Resources Inc.) (the "Company") was incorporated under the Business Corporations Act on November 18, 2016 in the province of British Columbia. The Company's common shares are traded on the Canadian Securities Exchange ("CSE") under the symbol "TUSK". The Company operates in a single business segment focusing on mineral exploration in Canada. The principal business office of the Company is located at #500 – 666 Burrard Street, Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada, V6C 3P6.

The Company's principal business activities include the acquisition and exploration of mineral property assets. As at January 31, 2023, the Company had not yet determined whether the Company's mineral property asset contains ore reserves that are economically recoverable. The recoverability of amount shown for exploration and evaluation asset is dependent upon the discovery of economically recoverable reserves, confirmation of the Company's interest in the underlying mineral claims, the ability of the Company to obtain the necessary financing to complete the development of and the future profitable production from the property or realizing proceeds from its disposition. The outcome of these matters cannot be predicted at this time and the uncertainties cast significant doubt upon the Company's ability to continue as a going concern.

The outbreak of the Coronavirus Disease 2019, or COVID-19, has spread across the globe and is impacting worldwide economic activity. This global pandemic poses the risk that the Company or its clients, employees, contractors, suppliers, and other partners may be unable to conduct regular business activities for an indefinite period of time. At this point, the impact on the Company has been minimal. The Company continues to monitor the situation and is taking all necessary precautions in order to follow rules and best practices as set out by the federal and provincial governments.

Three-month period ended January 31, 2023

During the three months ended January 31, 2023 the Company reported a net loss of \$927,421. (2022 - \$577,305). Included in the determination of operating loss was \$60,000 (2022 - \$92,250) spent on management fees, \$45,299 (2022 - \$35,546) on professional fees, \$11,616 (2022 - \$2,792) on transfer agent and filing fees, \$15,623 (2022 - \$121,839) on travel and promotion, \$367,969 (2022 - \$274,800) on consulting, \$342,394 (2022 - \$50,000) on investor communication and \$2,651 (2022 - \$78) on office and miscellaneous. The Company also incurred a stock based compensation charge of \$81,869 (2022 - \$Nil).

Nine-month period ended January 31, 2023

During the nine months ended January 31, 2023 the Company reported a net loss of \$1,711,061. (2022 - \$1,504,389). Included in the determination of operating loss was \$180,000 (2022 - \$232,250) spent on management fees, \$197,917 (2022 - \$107,180) on professional fees, \$37,904 (2022 - \$7,110) on transfer agent and filing fees, \$85,095 (2022 - \$262,605) on travel and promotion, \$741,639 (2022 - \$833,851) on consulting, \$375,294 (2022 - \$52,393) on investor communication and \$11,343 (2022 - \$9,270) on office and miscellaneous. The Company also incurred a stock based compensation charge of \$81,869 (2022 - \$Nil).

COMMITMENTS

During the period ended January 31, 2023, the Company issued flow-through common shares for gross proceeds of \$923,605. Expenditures related to the use of flow-through share proceeds are not available as a tax deduction to the Company as the tax benefits of these expenditures are renounced to the investors. As at April 30, 2022, the Company had \$133,594 (2021 - \$ nil) in unspent flow-through funds. The Company was required to incur these expenditures before December 31, 2021 under the general rule and before December 31, 2022 under the look-back rule.

SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Subsequent to January 31, 2023 the Company paid \$16,000 and issued 4,600,000 common shares at a deemed price of \$0.075 per share with a one-half warrant to acquire an exploration and evaluation asset. Each whole warrant is exercisable at \$0.10 to acquire one additional common share for a period of two years.

FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

International Financial Reporting Standards 7, *Financial Instruments: Disclosures*, establishes a fair value hierarchy that reflects the significance of the inputs used in making the measurements. The fair value hierarchy has the following levels:

Level 1 - quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities;

Level 2 - inputs other than quoted prices included in Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (i.e. as prices) or indirectly (i.e. derived from prices); and

Level 3 - inputs for the asset or liability that are not based on observable market data (unobservable inputs).

Fair Value of Financial Instruments

The Company's financial assets include cash and are classified as Level 1. The carrying value of these instruments approximates their fair values due to the relatively short periods of maturity of these instruments.

Fair value

The fair value of the Company's financial instruments approximates their carrying value as at January 31, 2023 because of the demand nature or short-term maturity of these instruments.

Financial risk management objectives and policies

The Company's financial instruments include cash and accounts payable. The risks associated with these financial instruments and the policies on how to mitigate these risks are set out below. Management manages and monitors these exposures to ensure appropriate measures are implemented on a timely and effective manner.

(i) Currency risk

The Company's expenses are denominated in Canadian dollars. The Company's corporate office is based in Canada and current exposure to exchange rate fluctuations is minimal.

The Company does not have any significant foreign currency denominated monetary liabilities. The principal business of the Company is the identification and evaluation of assets or a business and once identified or evaluated, to negotiate an acquisition or participation in a business subject to receipt of shareholder approval and acceptance by regulatory authorities.

(ii) Interest rate risk

The Company is exposed to interest rate risk on the variable rate of interest earned on bank deposits. The fair value interest rate risk on bank deposits is insignificant as the deposits are short-term.

The Company has not entered into any derivative instruments to manage interest rate fluctuations.

(iii) Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk of loss associated with the counterparty's inability to fulfill its payment obligations. Financial instruments that potentially subject the Company to concentrations of credit risks consist principally of cash. To minimize the credit risk, the Company places these instruments with a high quality financial institution.

(iv) Liquidity risk

In the management of liquidity risk of the Company, the Company maintains a balance between continuity of funding and the flexibility through the use of borrowings. Management closely monitors the liquidity position and expects to have adequate sources of funding to finance the Company's projects and operations.

CRITICAL ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES

The Company makes estimates and assumptions about the future that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities. Estimates and judgments are continually evaluated based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. Actual experience may differ from these estimates and assumptions.

The effect of a change in accounting estimate is recognized prospectively by including it in comprehensive income in the period of the change, if the change affects that period only, or in the period of the change and future periods, if the change affects both.

Information about critical accounting estimates in applying accounting policies that have the most significant risk of causing material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities recognized in the consolidated financial statements are discussed below:

Share-based payment transaction:

The Company measures the cost of equity-settled transactions with employees by reference to the fair value of the equity instruments at the date at which they are granted. Estimating fair value for share-based payment transactions requires determining the most appropriate valuation model, which is dependent on the terms and conditions of the grant. This estimate also requires determining the most appropriate inputs to the valuation model including the expected life of the share option, volatility and dividend yield and making assumptions about them.
