# **Independent Auditor's Report**

To the Shareholders of Rumble Resources Inc.

# **Opinion**

We have audited the financial statements of Rumble Resources Inc. (the "Company"), which comprise the statements of financial position as at July 31, 2024 and 2023, and the statements of comprehensive loss, changes in equity and cash flows for the years then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including material accounting policy information.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Company as at July 31, 2024 and 2023, and its financial performance and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards.

# **Basis for Opinion**

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. These events or conditions, along with other matters as set forth in Note 1, indicate that a material uncertainty exists that may cast significant doubt on the Company's ability to continue as a going concern. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters.

Notes to the Financial Statements July 31, 2024 and 2023 (Expressed in Canadian Dollars)

#### 1. Nature of Operations and Continuance of Business

Rumble Resources Inc. (formerly Rumble Capital Corp.) (the "Company"), was incorporated under the laws of British Columbia, Canada on June 23, 2017, and on December 14, 2020, the name was changed to Rumble Resources Inc. The Company's principal business plan is to acquire, explore and develop mineral properties and ultimately seek earnings by exploiting mineral claims. The Company's registered office is 741 Harbourfront Drive N.E., Salmon Arm, BC, V1E 3L4. On September 5, 2023, the Company started trading on the Canadian Securities Exchange ("CSE") under the symbol "RB".

These financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis which assumes that the Company will realize the carrying value of its assets and discharge its liabilities in the normal course of business. As at July 31, 2024, the Company has not generated any revenue and has accumulated losses of \$442,907 since inception. The Company's continuation as a going concern is dependent upon the successful results from its mineral property exploration activities and its ability to attain profitable operations and generate funds therefrom and/or raise equity capital or borrowings sufficient to meet current and future obligations. There is no guarantee that the Company will be able to complete any of the above objectives. These factors indicate the existence of a material uncertainty that may cast significant doubt on the Company's ability to continue as a going concern. While the Company has been successful in securing financings in the past, there is no assurance that it will be able to obtain adequate financing in the future or that such financing will be available on acceptable terms. These financial statements do not include any adjustments to the recoverability and classification of recorded asset amounts and classification of liabilities that might be necessary should the Company be unable to continue as a going concern. Such adjustments could be material.

#### 2. Material Accounting Policies

#### (a) Statement of Compliance and Basis of Presentation

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS") as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board ("IASB") and interpretations of the International Financial Reporting Interpretation Committee ("IFRIC") applicable to the preparation of financial statements.

These financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis, and are presented in Canadian dollars, which is the Company's functional currency.

## (b) Use of Estimates and Judgments

The preparation of these financial statements in conformity with IFRS requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and reported amounts of assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses. By their nature, estimates are subject to measurement uncertainty and changes in such estimates in future periods could require a material change in the financial statements. Accordingly, actual results may differ from these estimates. Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimate is revised and in any future periods affected.

Significant areas requiring the use of estimates include fair value of share-based payments, the recoverability of exploration and evaluation assets, and unrecognized deferred income tax assets. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Judgments made by management include the factors used to determine the assessment of whether the going concern assumption is appropriate. The assessment of the going concern assumption requires management to take into account all available information about the future, which is at least, but is not limited to, 12 months from the end of the reporting period. The Company is aware that material uncertainties related to events or conditions may cast significant doubt upon the Company's ability to continue as a going concern.

#### (c) Financial Instruments

#### (i) Classification

The Company classifies its financial instruments in the following categories: at fair value through profit and loss ("FVTPL"), at fair value through other comprehensive income (loss) ("FVTOCI") or at amortized cost. The Company determines the classification of financial assets at initial recognition. The classification of debt instruments is driven by the Company's business model for managing the financial assets and their contractual cash flow characteristics. Equity instruments that are held for trading are classified as FVTPL. For other equity instruments, on the day of acquisition the Company can make an irrevocable election (on an instrument-by-instrument basis) to designate them at FVTOCI. Financial liabilities are measured at amortized cost, unless they are required to be measured at FVTPL (such as instruments held for trading or derivatives) or if the Company has opted to measure them at FVTPL.

#### (ii) Measurement

#### Financial assets and liabilities at amortized cost

Financial assets and liabilities at amortized cost are initially recognized at fair value plus or minus transaction costs, respectively, and subsequently carried at amortized cost less any impairment.

#### Financial assets and liabilities at FVTPL

Financial assets and liabilities carried at FVTPL are initially recorded at fair value and transaction costs are expensed in the statements of comprehensive loss. Realized and unrealized gains and losses arising from changes in the fair value of the financial assets and liabilities held at FVTPL are included in the statements of comprehensive loss in the period in which they arise.

#### Debt investments at FVTOCI

These assets are subsequently measured at fair value. Interest income calculated using the effective interest method, foreign exchange gains and losses and impairment are recognised in profit or loss. Other net gains and losses are recognised in Other Comprehensive Income ("OCI"). On derecognition, gains and losses accumulated in OCI are reclassified to profit or loss.

#### Equity investments at FVTOCI

These assets are subsequently measured at fair value. Dividends are recognised as income in profit or loss unless the dividend clearly represents a recovery of part of the cost of the investment. Other net gains and losses are recognised in OCI and are never reclassified to profit or loss.

#### (iii) Derecognition

#### Financial assets

The Company derecognizes financial assets only when the contractual rights to cash flows from the financial assets expire, or when it transfers the financial assets and substantially all of the associated risks and rewards of ownership to another entity.

#### Financial liabilities

The Company derecognizes a financial liability when its contractual obligations are discharged, cancelled, or expire. The Company also derecognizes a financial liability when the terms of the liability are modified such that the terms and / or cash flows of the modified instrument are substantially different, in which case a new financial liability based on the modified terms is recognized at fair value.

Gains and losses on derecognition are generally recognized in profit or loss.

#### (e) Share Capital

Proceeds from the issuance of common shares are classified as equity. Transaction costs directly attributable to the issue of common shares and stock options are recognized as a deduction from equity, net of any tax effects.

Valuation of equity units issued in private placements

The Company has adopted a residual value method with respect to the measurement of shares and warrants issued as private placement units. The residual value method first allocates value to the more easily measurable component based on fair value and then the residual value, if any, to the less easily measurable component.

## (f) Income Taxes

#### Current income tax

Current income tax assets and liabilities for the current period are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the taxation authorities. The tax rates and tax laws used to compute the amount are those that are enacted or substantively enacted, at the reporting date. Current income tax relating to items recognized directly in other comprehensive income or equity is recognized in other comprehensive income or equity and not in the statement of operations. Management periodically evaluates positions taken in the tax returns with respect to situations in which applicable tax regulations are subject to interpretation and establishes provisions where appropriate.

#### Deferred income tax

Deferred income tax is provided using the statement of financial position method on temporary differences at the reporting date between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts for financial reporting purposes. The carrying amount of deferred income tax assets is reviewed at the end of each reporting period and recognized only to the extent that it is probable that sufficient taxable income will be available to allow all or part of the deferred income tax asset to be utilized. Deferred income tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply to the year when the asset is realized or the liability is settled, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period. Deferred income tax assets and deferred income tax liabilities are offset, if a legally enforceable right exists to set off current tax assets against current income tax liabilities and the deferred income taxes relate to the same taxable entity and the same taxation authority.

#### (g) Loss Per Share

Basic loss per share is computed using the weight average number of common shares outstanding during the period.

Diluted EPS is calculated by adjusting the earnings and number of shares for the effects of dilutive options and other dilutive potential units. The effects of anti-dilutive potential units are ignored in calculating diluted EPS. When a loss is incurred during the period, basic and diluted loss per share are the same as the exercise of stock options and share purchase warrants is considered to be anti-dilutive. As at July 31, 2024, the Company had 5,847,500 (2023 – 5,675,000) potentially dilutive shares outstanding.

#### (h) Share-based Payments

Share-based payments to employees are measured at the fair value of the instruments issued and amortized over the vesting periods. Share-based payments to non-employees are measured at the fair value of goods or services received or the fair value of the equity instrument issued if it is determined the fair value of the goods or services cannot be reliably measured and are recorded at the date the goods or services are received. The corresponding amount is credited to the equity reserve. The fair value of options is determined using the Black-Scholes Option Pricing Model. The number of shares and options expected to vest is reviewed and adjusted at the end of each reporting period such that the amount recognized for services received as consideration for the equity instruments granted, shall be based on the number of equity instruments that eventually vest.

#### (i) Exploration and Evaluation Assets

Exploration and evaluation expenditures include the costs of acquiring licenses, costs associated with exploration and evaluation activity, and the fair value (at acquisition date) of exploration and evaluation assets acquired in a business combination. Exploration and evaluation expenditures are capitalized. Costs incurred before the Company has obtained the legal rights to explore an area are recognized in profit or loss.

Government tax credits are recorded as a reduction to the cumulative costs incurred and capitalized on the related property in the period it is received.

Exploration and evaluation assets are assessed for impairment if (i) sufficient data exists to determine technical feasibility and commercial viability, and (ii) facts and circumstances suggest that the carrying amount exceeds the recoverable amount.

Once the technical feasibility and commercial viability of the extraction of resources in an area of interest are demonstrable, exploration and evaluation assets attributable to that area of interest are first tested for impairment and then reclassified to mining property and development assets within property, plant and equipment.

Recoverability of the carrying amount of any exploration and evaluation assets is dependent on successful development and commercial exploitation, or alternatively, sale of the respective areas of interest.

#### (j) Impairment of Non-Current Assets

At each reporting date, the Company reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there are any indications of impairment. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment, if any.

Where the asset does not generate cash flows that are independent from other assets, the Company estimates the recoverable amount of the cash generating unit ("CGU") to which the asset belongs. The recoverable amount is determined as the higher of fair value less direct costs to sell and the asset's value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value. Estimated future cash flows are calculated using estimated recoverable reserves, estimated future commodity prices and the expected future operating and capital costs. The pre-tax discount rate applied to the estimated future cash flows reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset for which the future cash flow estimates have not been adjusted.

If the carrying amount of an asset or CGU exceeds its recoverable amount, the carrying amount of the asset or CGU is reduced to its recoverable amount through an impairment charge to the statement of comprehensive loss.

Assets that have been impaired are tested for possible reversal of the impairment whenever events or changes in circumstance indicate that the impairment may have reversed. When an impairment subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset or CGU is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but only so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined (net of depreciation, depletion and amortization) had no impairment loss been recognized for the asset or CGU in prior periods. A reversal of impairment is recognized as a gain in the statement of comprehensive loss.

## (k) Recently Adopted Accounting Standards

#### Amendments to IAS 1 and IFRS Practice Statement 2

The IASB has issued amendments titled 'Disclosure of Accounting Policies' to IAS 1 and IFRS Practice Statement 2, effective from January 1, 2023. These changes guide entities to prioritize the disclosure of 'material' over 'significant' accounting policies. The amendments provide clarity on identifying material policies, emphasizing that information can be material due to its inherent nature, even if related amounts are immaterial. Additionally, IFRS Practice Statement 2 has been enhanced to support these changes. The adoption of these amendments resulted in certain changes to the Company's accounting policy disclosures.

#### Amendments to Definition of Accounting Estimates

In February 2021, the IASB issued amendments to IAS 8, in which it introduced a definition of 'accounting estimates'. The amendments clarify the distinction between changes in accounting estimates and changes in accounting policies and the correction of errors. Also, they clarify how entities use measurement techniques and inputs to develop accounting estimates. The amendments are effective for annual reporting periods beginning on or after January 1, 2023, and apply to changes in accounting policies and accounting estimates that occur on or after the start of that period. The adoption of these amendments is applicable to these financial statements and had no material impact.

#### Amendments to IAS 12 Income Taxes

Deferred Tax related to Assets and Liabilities arising from a Single Transaction clarifies the accounting for deferred tax on transactions such as leases and decommissioning obligations by removing the initial recognition exemption for transactions in which equal amounts of deductible and taxable temporary differences arise on initial recognition. The adoption of these amendments is applicable to these financial statements and had no material impact.

#### Woolford Creek Property

On October 15, 2020, as amended on December 15, 2023, the Company entered into a Mineral Property Option Agreement (the "Agreement"), whereby the Company was granted an option to acquire a 100% interest in 8 mining claims located in the Adams Lake area of the Kamloops Mining Division, British Columbia, covering 4,414 hectares (the "Woolford Creek Property"). Pursuant to the Agreement, the Company must make the following payments and expenditures in order to keep the option in good standing:

- \$35,000 upon execution of the Agreement (paid);
- ii) Issuance of 250,000 common shares after the date that the British Columbia Securities Commission issues a final receipt for the Company's initial public offering prospectus (issued at a fair value of \$25,000) (Note 5);
- iii) \$40,000 within four months of execution of the Agreement (paid);
- iv) Fund exploration and development work on the Woolford Creek Property of at least \$100,000 by June 30, 2024 (funded); and
- v) Fund exploration and development work on the Woolford Creek Property of at least an additional \$200,000 by June 30, 2025.

Once the above cash payment, share issuance, and exploration expenditures have been made, the Company shall have exercised the option and acquired 100% of the right, title and interest in the Woolford Creek Property. The Agreement may be terminated, and the transactions contemplated by the Agreement may be abandoned, at any time prior to exercise of the option by 30 day's written notice of the optionor upon the failing of the Company to make the required payments. The vendor shall retain a 2% net smelter royalty (subject to an optional repurchase of 1% of the NSR by the Company for \$1,000,000) in respect of all products produced from the property.

#### 4. Related Party Transactions

During the year ended July 31, 2024, the Company incurred consulting fees of \$30,000 (2023 – \$18,000) to a director of the Company. As at July 31, 2024, the Company owed \$27,944 (2023 – \$14,725) to the director of the Company. The amount is non-interest bearing, unsecured and due on demand.

During the year ended July 31, 2024, the Company incurred rent of \$6,000 (2023 - \$6,000) to a company controlled by a director of the Company. As at July 31, 2024, the Company owed \$2,000 (2023 - \$500) to the company controlled by a director of the Company. The amount is non-interest bearing, unsecured and due on demand.

During the year ended July 31, 2024, the Company recognized share-based compensation of \$818 (2023 – \$15,344) for officers and directors of the Company (Note 6).

On April 6, 2023, the Company entered into a promissory note agreement for \$5,000 with a director of the Company, which was unsecured, non-interest bearing and due on demand any time after June 15, 2024. The Company repaid the promissory note on August 1, 2023.

#### 5. Share Capital

Authorized: Unlimited common shares without par value.

Share transaction for the year ended July 31, 2024:

On September 5, 2023, the Company completed its initial public offering (the "IPO") and issued 1,725,000 common shares at \$0.10 per share for gross proceeds of \$172,500. In connection with the IPO, the Company paid a corporate finance fee of \$20,000, an agent's commission of \$17,250, other offering costs of \$11,685, and issued 172,500 agent warrants with a fair value of \$12,991. Each agent warrant entitles the holder to purchase one common share at an exercise price of \$0.10 per share until September 5, 2025. In connection with the listing of the Company's common shares, the Company also incurred a total of \$66,012 of listing expenses.

During the year ended July 31, 2024, the Company received a total of \$50,000 pursuant to the exercise of a total of 500,000 warrants at \$0.10 per share. As at July 31, 2024, the common shares have not been issued and the amount has been recognized as shares issuable (Note 13).

Share transaction for the year ended July 31, 2023:

On June 7, 2023, the Company issued 250,000 common shares with a fair value of \$25,000 pursuant to a Mineral Property Purchase Agreement for the Woolford Creek Property (Note 3).

On June 12, 2023, the Company issued 77,000 common shares and 4,875,000 Units upon the exercise of special warrants (Note 7). Each Unit consists of one common share and one common share purchase warrant, with each common share purchase warrant exercisable at \$0.10 per share for a period of 5 years following the date the Company lists on a stock exchange. Using the residual value method, no value was allocated to the common share purchase warrants. In connection with the issuance of Units, the Company recognized share issuance costs of \$12,840.

#### Escrow shares

The Company has 2,000,000 common shares held in escrow as at July 31, 2024 (2023 – 2,000,000), which will be released in tranches over a 36-month period, beginning no earlier than 10 days following the public announcement of the completion of the first-phase exploration program on the Company's Woolford Creek Property (the "Initial Release Date"). The release will occur every six months following the Initial Release, with the initial release comprising 200,000 of the escrowed securities, and each subsequent release comprising 300,000 escrowed securities.

#### 6. Stock Options

The Company's Board of Directors approved a stock incentive plan dated May 19, 2021. The Board of directors is authorized to grant options to directors, officers, and employees to acquire up to 10% of the issued and outstanding commons shares of the Company. The exercise price will not be less than the discounted market price defined in the policies of the CSE. The options that may be granted under this plan must be exercisable for over a period of not exceeding ten years, provided the Company is listed on the CSE.

#### 7. Special Warrants

- (a) On March 19, 2021, the Company completed a private placement of 4,875,000 special warrants at \$0.05 per special warrant for gross proceeds of \$243,750. Each special warrant entitles holders to acquire, without payment of any consideration in addition to that already paid, one common share of the Company and one transferrable share purchase warrant. Each share purchase warrant entitles the holder to acquire one additional common share of the Company for a period of five years from the date the Company's shares commence trading on a recognized stock exchange at a price of \$0.10 per share. All unexercised special warrants will be deemed to be exercised on the third business day after a receipt is issued for a final prospectus by the securities regulatory authorities in each of the Provinces of Canada where the special warrants were sold (the "Final Prospectus Date"). On June 12, 2023, 4,875,000 special warrants were exercised (Note 5).
- (b) On April 13, 2021, the Company completed a private placement of 77,000 special warrants at \$0.10 per special warrant for gross proceeds of \$7,700. Each special warrant entitles subscribers to acquire, without payment of any consideration in addition to that already paid, one common share of the Company. All unexercised special warrants will be deemed to be exercised on the Final Prospectus Date. On June 12, 2023, 77,000 special warrants were exercised (Note 5).

#### 9. Financial Instruments

The Company, as part of its operations, carries financial instruments consisting of cash, accounts payable, due to related parties, and note payable to related party. It is management's opinion that the Company is not exposed to significant credit, interest, or currency risks arising from these financial instruments except as otherwise disclosed.

#### (a) Fair Values

The Company classifies cash as FVTPL. The Company classifies accounts payable, due to related parties and note payable to related party as amortized cost. The fair values of financial instruments, which include cash, accounts payable, due to related party, and note payable to related party, approximate their carrying values due to the relatively short-term maturity of these instruments.

#### (b) Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk that one party to a financial instrument will fail to discharge an obligation and cause the other party to incur a financial loss. Financial instruments that potentially subject the Company to a concentration of credit risk consist primarily of cash. The Company limits its exposure to credit loss by placing its cash with high credit quality financial institutions. Management monitors the amount of credit extended to the parties for expense recoveries. The carrying amount of financial assets represents the maximum credit exposure.

#### (c) Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Company will not be able to meet its financial obligations as they fall due. The Company currently settles its financial obligations out of cash. The ability to do this relies on the Company raising debt or equity financing in a timely manner and by maintaining sufficient cash in excess of anticipated needs.

#### (d) Market Risk

Market risk is the risk of loss that may arise from changes in market factors such as interest rates, foreign exchange rates, and commodity and equity prices. The Company does not have significant exposure to these risks.

#### 10. Capital Management

The Company manages its capital to maintain its ability to continue as a going concern and to provide returns to shareholders and benefits to other stakeholders. The capital structure of the Company consists of cash and equity comprised of issued share capital, equity reserve and warrant reserve. The Company manages its capital structure and makes adjustments to it in light of changes to economic conditions. The Company, upon approval from its Board of Directors, will balance its overall capital structure through new share issues or by undertaking other activities as deemed appropriate under the specific circumstances. The Company is not subject to externally imposed capital requirements.

#### 11. Segment Reporting

The Company operates in a single reportable segment, which is the acquisition, exploration and development of exploration and evaluation assets in Canada.

#### 12. Income Taxes
